OREGON VOLUNTEER FIREFIGHTERS ASSOCIATION CONDUCT POLICY

This document is not intended to replace the use of common sense.

The intent of this policy is to promote safety, appropriate behavior and the overall success of functions sanctioned by the Oregon Volunteer Firefighters Association.

It is incumbent upon all attendees to monitor the actions of themselves and others; ensure that a safe environment is maintained, and to intervene where necessary and/or practical.

Chief Officers and Volunteer Association Presidents will be made aware of this policy and asked to review it with their members prior to attending any Association function. They should encourage and remind their firefighters that they are to represent their fire department/district in an appropriate manner. By the voluntary act of registering for any OVFA function, attendees will accept and agree to comply with this policy. Everyone is a guest of the agency hosting the event, their department/district, and their community. Attendees should demonstrate respect by conducting themselves in a professional and appropriate manner. Any actions that are deemed contrary to this could result in the attendee being asked to leave.

The individual(s) shall be asked to stop the behavior. If individual(s) does not stop the behavior, the individual(s) shall be required to leave the function as directed by any member of the Executive Board.

Grounds for removal from an OVFA function shall be any acts or actions that are deemed inappropriate or would bring discredit to the Association, including such actions of malfeasance, misfeasance or nonfeasance. Such actions will be addressed as soon as they are brought to the attention of any OVFA Executive Board member.

Examples of inappropriate behavior may include, but not limited to, the following:

- Use of inappropriate or harassing language
- Creating a commotion or disruption
- Harassment of other guests or attendees
- Supplying alcohol to a minor
- An individual showing visible signs of intoxication

Such action does not entitle the agency of the dismissed individual(s) to any refund of registration fees.

As soon as possible following the incident, the Board will convene an Executive session to address the incident. If deemed necessary, following the close of the conference the OVFA President shall prepare a written incident report outlining the circumstances of the incident and the individual(s) involved in the expulsion. A copy of the incident report shall be sent via certified mail to the Chief of the agency involved explaining the cause of the expulsion from an event and describing future actions.

A panel comprised of members of the Oregon Volunteer Firefighters Association and others identified by the President of the OVFA may contemplate further punitive action against the individual or the agency they represent. Individuals and agencies will have the opportunity to meet with the review panel to address any proposed action prior to the panel rendering a final decision.

Again, this document is not intended to replace the use of common sense.

This year we are honored to have Charlie Dickinson as our keynote speaker for the banquet Saturday night.

President Bush appointed Chief Dickinson to his current position as Deputy Administrator, in April of 2002. As the Deputy Administrator of the United States Fire Administration (USFA), Chief Dickinson manages all day-today operations of the USFA's National Emergency Training Center (NETC) facility and oversees all projects and programs of the USFA as assigned by the USFA Administrator and FEMA leadership.

Charlie began his 44-year fire service career as a firefighter in 1962 in the City of Hayward, California, Fire Department. Rising through the ranks, he was promoted to Battalion Chief in 1981 and served for three years in the Hayward Fire Department as the city's Emergency Services Coordinator.

In 1986, Chief Dickinson was appointed as an Assistant Fire Chief of the Pittsburgh,



Pennsylvania, Bureau of Fire. As an Assistant Chief, Charlie managed the Operations Division and the Training Division. In September of 1988, he was appointed to the position the Fire Chief of the Pittsburgh Bureau of Fire and served in that capacity for 10 years before retiring from the Bureau in late 1998.

Chief Dickinson served as the Acting Fire Administrator from September 2005 until July of 2007.

Throughout his career, Chief Dickinson has served on numerous committees and projects for the International Association of Fire Chiefs (IAFC) and the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) and other national organizations. Chief Dickinson continues to volunteer his time by working with the National Fallen Firefighters Foundation (NFFF) to remember fallen firefighters.

The emphasis of this class will be to focus on the mechanics of pump operations. The instructor wants to develop pump technicians not level pullers. Pump operators need to know how to diagnose and correct pumping problems.

BASIC ROPE RESCUE

Building Construction

This class will help you gain knowledge about building classifications, importance of fire resistance for structural support elements and the risks of performing fire suppression inside and around buildings involved in fire. This should enhance the skills of reading a building correctly. This course will satisfy all learning objectives for DPSST requirements for Fire Officer I & II and for Fire Ground leader.

☑ ☑ ☑ FIRE INVESTIGATION

This class will give you the tools you need to have confidence in fire investigation. An actual on scene "dig" will follow the classroom portion of instruction where attendees will be evaluated in their investigative abilities and presentations of their findings will follow the "dig. Attendees will be able to complete a significant portion of their Fire Investigator Task Book, so be sure to bring it with you!

X X X ITAC

We like to say that the *Clinic* provides *music* to the *words* of the NIMS 'incident command system.' Using the acronym *ITAC, we target* the four components of a competently managed incident: One that is *competent* and *confident* (based on NIMS ICS), Tactical Accountability of all personnel at all times, Action Planning that is quick, easy, and thorough, Communication that is *clear, concise*, and *disciplined*.

S130/190 WILDLAND FIREFIGHTER 2 TRAINING & INTRO TO WILDLAND FIRE BEHAVIOR

Upon completion the student will be able to: Gain the skills necessary to function as a wildland firefighter 2 including shelter deployment, tool usage, fire behavior knowledge in the wildland arena designed around the basics of fuel, weather and topography. Examining how these factors affect fire behavior in terms of safety and fire suppression actions.

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S215 FIRE OPERATIONS IN THE WILDLAND/URBAN INTERFACE

This course is designed to assist structure and wildland firefighters who will be making tactical decisions when confronting wildland fire that threatens life, property, and improvements in the wildland/urban interface. It provides the student with the skills and knowledge to size-up a wildland/urban interface fire incident, evaluate the potential situation, order and deploy the necessary resources, and apply safe and effective strategy and tactics to minimize the threat to life and property.

PUMPER OPERATOR - KEVIN HENDRICKS, CHIEF - WOODBURN FIRE DISTRICT

Chief Hendricks started as a volunteer firefighter in Sublimity in 1972 and was Fire Chief from 1979 - 1991. He worked for Marion County Fire District #1 from 1977 - 1982. In 1991he was hired as Fire Chief at Woodburn Fire District. Throughout his career he has been involved in the maintenance and repair of fire pumps.

STANTON COOKE, BATTALION CHIEF



X X **GEMS (GERIATRICS EDUCATION FOR EMS)**

Geriatric Education for Emergency Medical Services. Developed by the American Geriatrics Society and the National Council of State EMS Training Coordinators, GEMS is an exciting curriculum designed specifically to help EMS providers address all of the special needs of the older population.

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INSTRUCTOR I

Upon completion of this course, the student shall be able to deliver instruction effectively from a prepared lesson plan; properly demonstrate use of instructional aids and evaluation instruments; adapt lesson plans given unique requirements of the students; organize the learning environment given a lionizing situation, and comply with record-keeping requirements. Must register before May 15 to receive pre-course CD and assignments.

ONE-DAY CLASSES

AUTO EXTRICATION (HYBRIDS)

This course meets the requirements of the NFPA 1670 Ops Level Course for Vehicle Extrication. Students will participate in both classroom and in hands on. We'll will review new vehicle technology and learn techniques designed to conquer today's vehicles. Hands on will include scenarios with vehicles; pt care and removal will also be addressed. These hours can be applied to EMS recertification hours.

X X X **BURN TRAILER**

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This hands-on classic is fun for firefighter. Whether you're a veteran or a "newbie" this class has something for you. After a brief safety update students will head to the trailer for some serious firefighting in a flash over setting. Students must have obtained entry-level firefighter to participate.

ABOUT THE INSTRUCTOR

SAM PHILLIPS, TRAINING CHIEF, HILLSBORO FIRE & RESCUE

Chief Phillips joined Hillsboro Fire & Rescue in 2005 and brings more than 29 years of experience. He is a graduate of the Executive Fire Officer Program, earned his Bachelors Degree in Management, holds an Associate Degree in Fire Science and is certified as Instructor for Leadership Development Studies. He has developed and delivered Confined Space training for over 15 years to both large metro and small rural fire department members.

ABOUT THE INSTRUCTOR

LT. CHRIS MILLS / OPERATIONS, TUALATIN VALLEY FIRE & RESCUE

Chris has been in the fire service for 18 years; the last 12 have been spent on TVFR's Technical Rescue Team as a career firefighter. During his career he has worked as a FF, Engineer, and currently hold the rank of Lieutenant. He has been involved in rewriting the extrication program and techniques used at TVFR. These techniques have been taught both internally at TVFR and externally at OVFR, First Due Conference, and at the 2007 Oregon EMS Conference

TVF&R STAFF

☑ ☑ ☑ FIRE PROPS

Come ready to play with propane props! After a short classroom safety update and briefing students will hit the pavement for a day of "hands on" excitement learning the basics of propane fire behavior and how to stop a propane fire.

RAPID INTERVENTION TEAM TRAINING

This course will look at building a set of tools that the firefighter can use when assigned to the role of RIT. From how we look at the building and the tools carried to overcoming rescue problems and working as teams. The student, whether an officer or firefighter, will be challenged by the fundamentals by one of the most difficult tasks we can be called upon to do...rescuing our own.

EVERYTHING EMS

This is a class that provides something of everything. Rather than the standard approach to continuing education, this class is modeled after EMS in real life. That is, you respond to one call after another, with each one being a different type of problem than the last. The theme for this class: providing applicable knowledge and skills for a variety of emergencies. You will learn tools for assessment, how to be a good "medical sleuth", and medical problems encountered in the field that aren't taught in school.

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AIR AMBULANCE OPERATIONS

This class is designed to improve your knowledge of air ambulance operations. You will gain a better understanding of the appropriate use of air ambulance, steps necessary for a safe landing zone, equipment associated with safe air ambulance operation, and examples of situations that the fire personnel can use to better prepare them for using air ambulances. Attendees will have an opportunity to talk to flight crewmembers, including a pilot. Weather and activity level permitting, an aircraft will be on site.

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KEVIN CLARK BATTALION CHIEF, RETIRED

Chief Clark began his career of 31 years as a resident volunteer at Marion County Fire District #1 while attending fire school at Chemekta Community College.

JASON BLOUNT, HILLSBORO FD

Jason Blount has 22 years experience as a Firefighter and is a Lieutenant/ Paramedic with the Hillsboro Fire Department. He is the secretary/ treasurer for the Western Washington County Training Association and is also a member of the Northwest Fire Trainers Association. At Hillsboro Fire Department he has been heavily involved in training including RIT operations.

SCOTT COOPER, AS, FF/ENG/NREMT-P

EMT adjunct faculty teaching at Chemeketa Community College since 1988, taught EMT courses at Portland C. College 1994-95. NFPA Fire Instructor II. Coordinated and taught trauma courses for OVFA in 1991, 1996 & 1997; EMS Everything 2007. Scott is a professional educator and also serves as a Proctor for National and Oregon State EMT / Paramedic exams since 1989. He also is an Instructor for ACLS, CPR, PHTLS, and AMLS.

BERNIE ZOLLNER, EMT-P, LIFEFLIGHT

Bernie is a 26-year veteran of fire and Emergency medical Services. He was a volunteer firefighter and board member of Woodburn Fire District and has worked ground ambulance service for Woodburn Ambulance. Presently he is an adjunct instructor in the Chemeketa Community College Paramedic Program. Bernie is a PEPP, ACLS, BLS, and PHTLS instructor and in his 10th year working for Life Flight Network, LLC, where he is a flight medic and also the EMS Outreach Coordinator

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BOMBS & EXPLOSIVES

This class consists of classroom instructions to introduce you to common explosives and safety issues, as well as common improvised explosive devices, their functioning and safety concerns. We'll covers basics of common arson indicators, red flags, legal issues and safety concerns for first responders. We will demo some basic explosive characteristics and the tools and equipment available for response from the Bomb Squad.

EVERYONE GOES HOME

LIGHT AIRCRAFT EMERGENCIES

Over 95% of aircraft incidents in Oregon involve light aircraft at small municipal airports. This course helps prepare firefighters to respond to aircraft rescue and fire fighting emergencies utilizing structural equipment and modified ARFF tactics. Students will learn how to gain access to aircraft, properly shut down running aircraft engines, how to properly use foam hand line streams in an aircraft incident and finally how to perform all emergency actions in a safe and professional manner.

☑ WATER RESCUE OPERATIONS

Through real world experience Chief Oliver brings actual hands on experience of **what to do** and **what not to do** on water rescue incidents. The fast paced presentation will prepare the first responder and incident commander with the tools to act safely and command and control a water rescue incident. A series of actual incident analyses will bring the culmination of the class and facilitate student interaction. This is the opportunity to interact with other responders in an open forum to discuss real life incidents with real life outcomes.

ABOUT THE INSTRUCTOR

BOMBS & EXPLOSIVES - DETECTIVE WILLIAM R. HAKIM, OREGON STATE POLICE

Detective Bill Hakim of the Oregon State Police has been assigned to the Arson/Explosives Section in Salem, Oregon, since 1999 as a Fire Investigator and a Bomb Technician. He has completed the National Fire Academy's Fire/Arson Investigation Course and the FBI's Hazardous Devices Course. Det. Hakim is also a HAZMAT Technician and a graduate of the U.S. Navy's Explosive Ordnance Disposal School.

EVERYONE GOES HOME - ROB DAHL, BORING FIRE DISTRICT

LIGHT AIRCRAFT EMERGENCIES - PAUL REYNOLDS.

Paul Reynolds is a 32-year veteran of the fire service. Currently he is the director of the Emergency Services Training Department at Southwestern Oregon Community College in Coos bay. He is also the deputy Chief/Training Officer for Sumner FD in Coos County. Paul's ARFF experience includes 20 years as United States Air Force airport firefighter. He rose through the ranks and held the position of fire chief while in the USAF. In addition, Paul was the senior ARFF volunteer at North Bend FD in Coos County for seven years. He trained numerous NBFD volunteers to assist the career staff in ARFF operations at the North Bend airport.

WATER RESCUE OPERATIONS - BATTALION CHIEF JOHN OLIVER, CLACKAMAS FIRE & RESCUE

Battalion Chief John Oliver has been in the Oregon fire service for over 23 years. He started his fire service career as a volunteer firefighter and now oversees the Training and Safety Division at Clackamas Fire District #1. He developed and implemented the water rescue program at Clackamas Fire and was the station Captain of the Water Rescue unit for many years. While responding with the Clackamas County Water Rescue Consortium he and his crews logged over 50 water rescues each year. These responses ranged from incidents involving the ominous Willamette Falls to the remote wilderness of the Clackamas River. Adding to his experience base he also owns a successful private marine consulting business teaching watercraft-rescue related courses all over the northwest.

I understand and acknowledge that Keizer Fire Department and Chemeketa Community College are acting as the agents of the Oregon Volunteer Firefighters Association (OVFA) in coordinating its annual conference, beginning on June 18, 2008.
